ELECTIVE SEMINARS (5)

Notes:

- 1. Historical breadth requirement: 2 seminars dealing with material predating 1800
- 2. Language requirement: 2 seminars in a language other than that of intended specialization
- 3. Comparative literature requirement: At least 4 seminars must be LTCO courses. Any LTCO courses used to fulfill primary literature, secondary literature or tertiary literature must be substantially focused upon the relevant language and deal with materials in the original language.
- 4. The following types of course may apply to the worksheet *if approved via petition*, without any specific limitation:
 - a. Literature Dept upper division undergraduate courses (LT** 100-190), where additional readings and assignments bring the course workload up to the level of a graduate seminar *and* a letter grade of "A" or higher is earned.
 - b. Literature Dept graduate independent study courses (LT** 298) for topics not covered by the regular seminar offerings.

5. Up to **6 total (maximum)** courses from outside of the Literature Dept may apply to the worksheet, with **no more than 2** applying to the "Literatures in English - LTEN (4)" requirement. The following stipulations also apply:

- a. UCSD graduate seminars from other departments may apply to the "Elective Seminars" requirement. A petition is required to apply these courses to any other requirements.
- b. UCSD upper division (100-190) undergraduate courses from other departments, where additional readings and assignments bring the course workload up to the level of a graduate seminar *and* a letter grade of "A" or higher is earned, *if approved via petition*. Unless there is adequate justification for the course(s) fitting into one of the other requirements, these courses will apply to the "Elective Seminars" requirement.
- c. Graduate courses from a student's time in a previous Master's program, *if approved via petition*. Unless there is adequate justification for the course(s) fitting into one of the other requirements, these courses will apply to the "Elective Seminars" requirement.
